Long, winding lines, lack of communication, and plenty of frustration were the order of the day. Dream along with me for a moment to a better solution...

Good news students! Fall Frenzy procedures have

been simplified so don't be afraid to attend! The “old” procedure required that a student's “status” be checked for “HOLD FLAGS” which include things like outstanding payments, fines, etc. before being allowed to register. That's what created the long waiting lines last year.



Each year prior to early registration, the campus sends out a notice informing you who your advisor is and other information. This notice will now also include the student's current status. You will need this form when you meet with your advisor and when you register. If you have any “hold” flags, it will also explain each type of flag and how to make them go away. The college is also exploring ways to have this information available online in the future so that each student

can check their status at any time.

IMPORTANT: If you do have flags, it will be your responsibility to get the “blue approval stamp” from the Student Services office on your form indicating that all your flags have been removed. You will need to show this form when you meet with your advi

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WCCC Launches Shuttle Program



offered in the spring, plus, the notice of cancellation said that I could still pay my bill and be "reinstated" into my classes. This, however, is a little misleading. It should have read "re-sign up" for classes as I had to fill out an add/drop form and try to squeeze into any empty seats.

What might work a little better for a situation like this would be to either send a letter of warning a week before the payment deadline to a student that hasn't paid, or, once the deadline is past, put the student on a "temporary suspension" list and send a letter telling them that they have 3 days from a specific date to make payment or their classes will be cancelled. This could be beneficial for students that missed payment, allowing them to retain the classes they signed up for and not be forced out because one of the classes filled up.

People can forget about things because they are busy or things get lost in the mail. Providing a safety net for events such as these and others can prevent headaches and can also help keep students from "Missing the Bus" of higher education.

WCCC Cancelled My Graduation, Again

One week before the start of Spring Semester, 2008, I received a telephone call from WCCC informing me that one of my scheduled classes had been canceled due to insufficient enrollment. This was problematic for me in several ways, not the least of which was that I had already paid for the course. The college assured me that I would receive a refund – and I did, three weeks later – but I had designed my schedule both to meet the requirements of my major and to accommodate my job, and the cancellation upset both priorities. Needless to say, I was irritated.

The college regularly publishes a catalogue of available courses, and one expects it to be reliable, especially when certain courses are listed as mandatory for a particular major. What is a student supposed to do then, when a required course

is canceled – perhaps repeatedly? One might answer glibly that he just won't graduate until the course becomes available, but that would be obtuse. Not everyone has the time or resources to be a perpetual student. And what does the student do if the rest of his schedule hinges on the canceled course? Yes, he could rearrange his classes – with sufficient warning, which one week is not. Toward the start of the semester, slots close and options diminish. Does the administration consider this when it perfunctorily cancels classes? More pointedly, does it think before listing courses that regularly fail to attract students? My experience suggests not, and that is a problem in need of a solution.

Here is my suggestion: Before compiling the course catalogue for each semester, poll students to de-

termine which courses are actually in demand. This need not be a complicated process: it could be conducted via Campus Connections (which already features periodic pop-up questionnaires), with polls tailored for specific majors. If a course fails to elicit sufficient interest, do not list it in the catalogue. Simple. The benefits of such a measure would be twofold: first, students would not waste time chasing elusive courses; second, the administration would garner valuable data on the needs of the student body. The polls might even incorporate a “suggestion box”, in which students could propose new courses to the faculty and staff. The result would be a more reliable course structure and fewer last-minute schedule corrections.

For those few of you who have not been able to accomplish this before Fall Frenzy or if you forgot to bring the form to registration, there will be a special line JUST FOR YOU, not the whole student population. So don't forget the form! If you have no flags, but have no form, you'll be standing in this line to get a copy and a “blue approval stamp”.

Plans are in place for faculty advising to take place in the gymnasium and registration in the cafeteria. This should allow for a much better flow of the registration lines. Once you've met with your advisor, proceed to the cafeteria where a bank of 10 or more computers and registrars will be available to help you register.

Facilitators will also be available to

help direct you to where you need to go, keep lines flowing, and answer questions. Want to make a buck? Volunteer to be a facilitator during early registration. The college is looking for a few good people to help out.

Before “Fall Frenzy” 2007, I had never heard of a “hold flag”. To keep students better informed, we will use campus newsletters, flyers, and also Campus Connections to post details and reminders such as how to clear any
